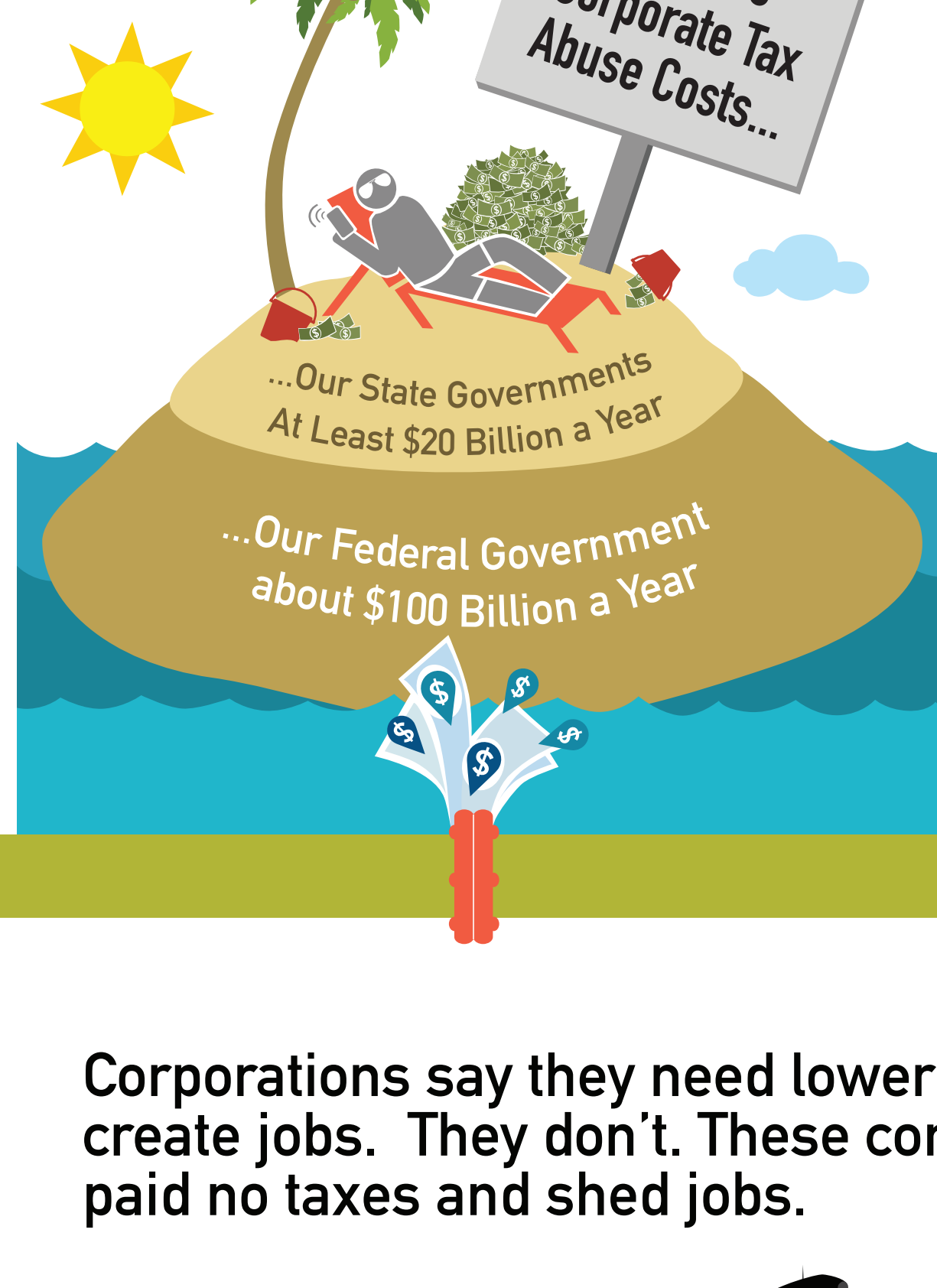
Corporate Tax Share of Federal Budget Falling For Decades

Corporations and the wealthiest are paying less in taxes.



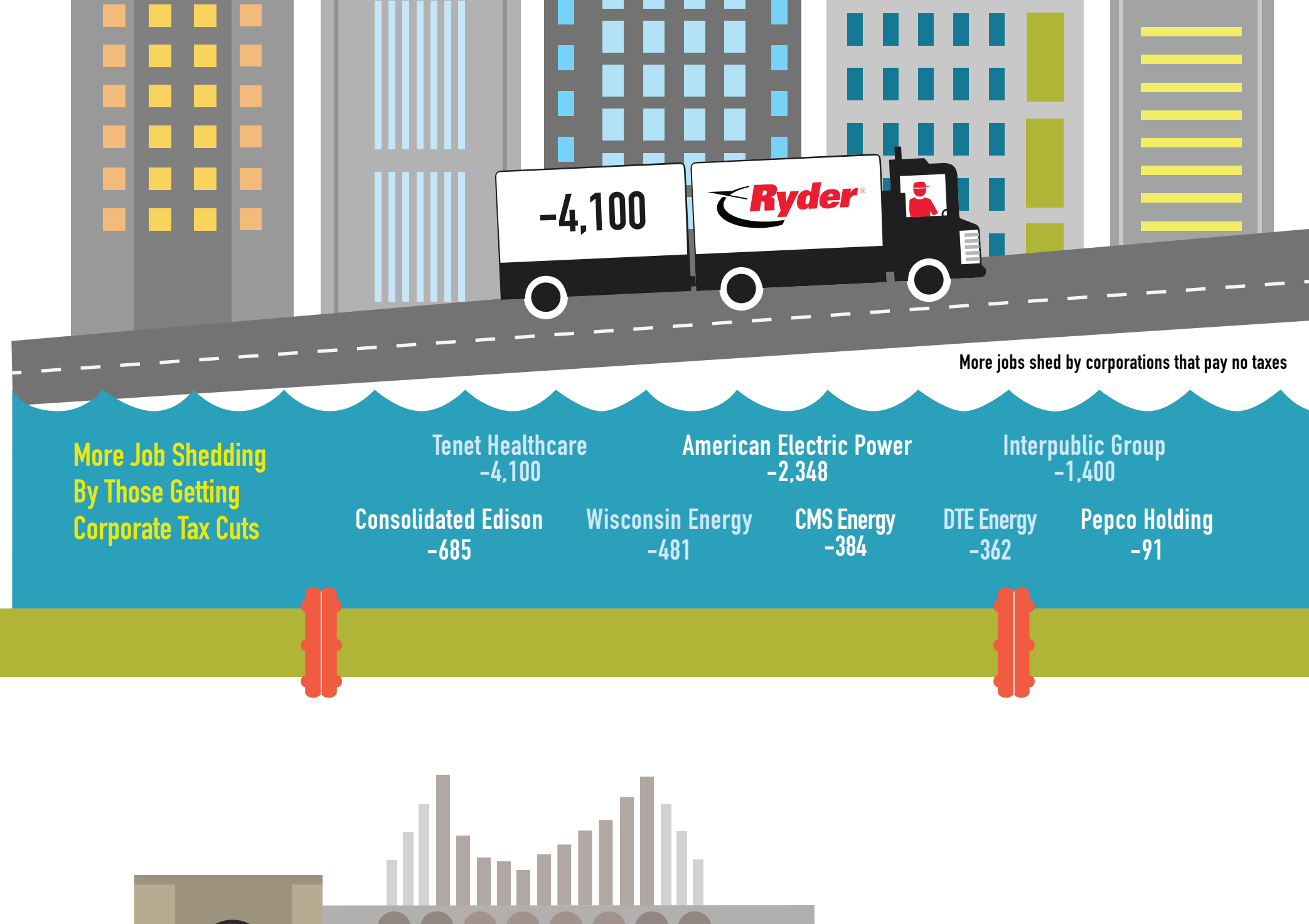
Profits are at an all-time high. But corporations and the wealthy aren't paying their fair share.

Corporations say they need lower taxes to create jobs. They don't. These companies paid no taxes and shed jobs.

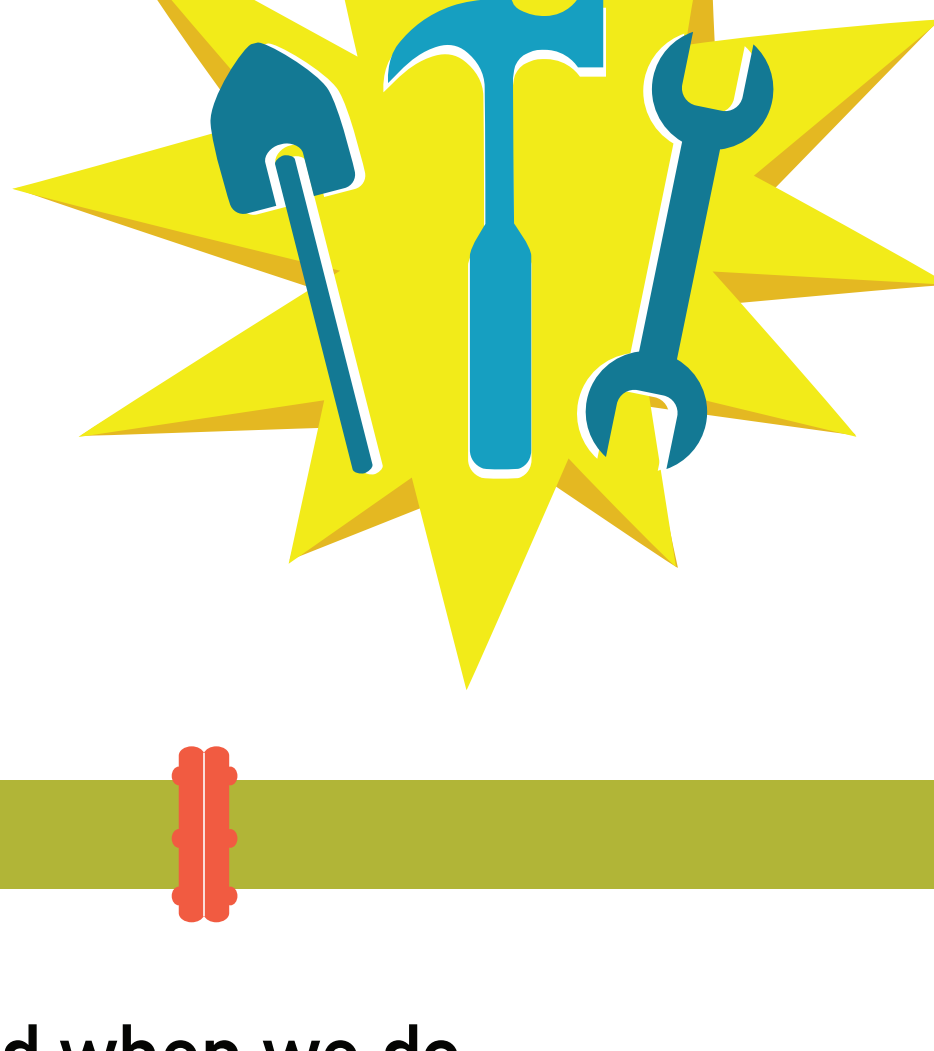


Our public structures are starving for resources.

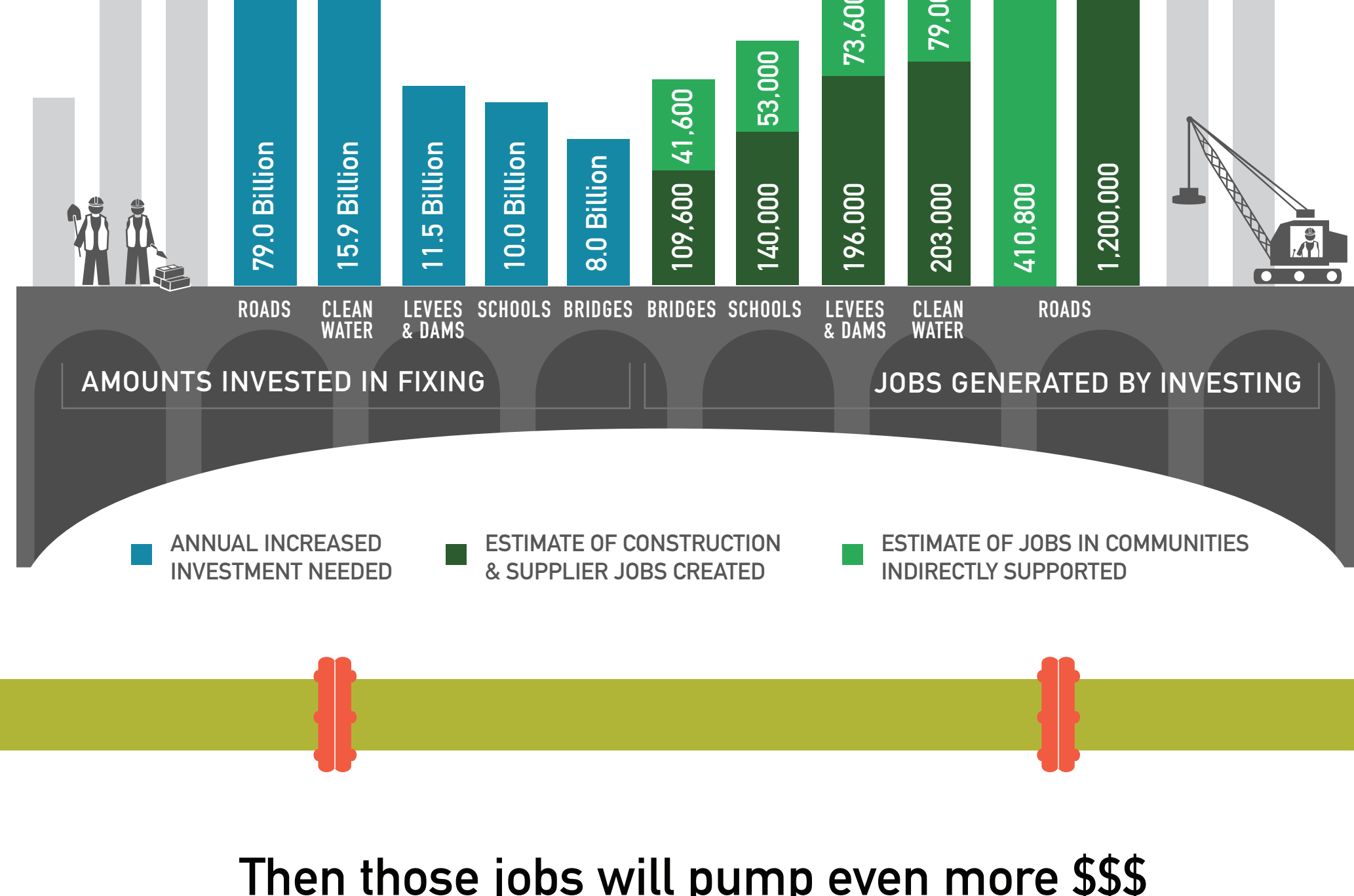
YIKES! The American Society of Civil Engineers says our structures are barely making the grade for safety.
